Fabric Report ... Peter (PB 1)

Firstly, I would like to record my thanks to our Ministry Assistant for his help in many ways, particularly highlighting issues to be addressed and keeping us up-to-date with statutory compliance. I have found plenty to do around our buildings and grounds:

- hinges on the alley gate upgraded to heavy duty ones
- freed the door to the crypt that was jammed shut
- gutters and downpipes were checked, cleaned and cleared at both the Church and the Manse.
- outside some much-needed attention, sanding and varnishing to the Kelvedon Road external doors and benches and noticeboards
- the railings were also sanded and repainted. (I hope to do the gates in 2023.)
- Internally, fixes included cleaning blistered paint behind the kitchen fridge and repainting
- sanding and revarnishing to remove marks on the hall floor.

Many minor jobs have been done and forgotten!

Some jobs are not able to be done 'in house':

- We needed help from a locksmith for the garage doors.
- A hall window winder also needed expert attention.
- We are awaiting work for the damp in the church lounge when the weather is a little warmer
- Some minor electrical and plumbing work are pending.

Thanks to Barry and Rita E work to improve and refresh the Manse are underway including renewal of the central heating boiler.

I already have projects in mind for this year when it is warmer including repainting the floor of the accessible toilet and painting the inside of the kitchen windows.

I would like to thank Kathleen for all time and work given to the grounds, prior to her retirement in April. We are grateful to those who have taken on the care of planters and hanging baskets which have done well. We are grateful also to Jonathan for watering throughout the summer, to Harry for hedge cutting and all who have helped in the grounds.

Our aim this year has been to try and make the grounds more manageable. On Saturday the 14 May we had a work day and thanks go to the volunteers armed with loppers and secateurs etc. we cut back shrubs, cut tops off holly trees and cleared rubbish; all went into the skip. The work day ended with an excellent lunch prepared and served by our Catering Team and much appreciated, thank you. A second skip was filled a month later. A new battery lawn trimmer purchased makes edging of lawns easy as the mower doesn't cut edges. Also, I have taken out the rest of the Holly trees.

Bind weed is a big problem in the grounds. In one area, next to the pond, I have dug up all the perennials and set aside, dug up and cleared three bags of bind weed roots, whilst another area has had black polythene put on in a bid to kill off the bind weed. If we can keep on top of the weeding things should be more manageable.

Adopting a planter, flowerbed or border, along with pulling out the old a weed or deadheading a flower, can help the Team and maintain the recognition of the Walmer in Bloom judges, who this year, awarded a Certificate of Excellence for our grounds displays.

Along with our own functions, our suite of rooms are still used regularly. Keep fit, singing for the over 50's (Living Lively) and the Rosamond Club continue to be popular.

We have two new hirers, who hire the church lounge; a poetry writing group meet regularly on Wednesday mornings, and a gentleman who provides 1-1 counselling.

We welcomed a Vintage Road Show back in November. Albeit a dreadful day of rain, many from the community came with their antiques!

We continue to pray for our community who come into our building week by week. We pray they will be drawn to read the many posters and to attend all of our events.

We really went to town holding sales on the 1st Tuesday of the month in the Church Lounge, one at Eastry Summer Fair, four in St Georges Hall, Deal, one at the Scout Hut Balfour Road.

This activity was only possible with the great help of those who volunteered their time and of course the knitting and crochet talents of everyone in the group. The total raised was £1,890.

Knitwear sales will continue in the New Year on the 1st Tuesday of each month in the Church Lounge and at other dates and
